



An exciting, practical degree for agriculture

The **Bachelor of Agricultural Production and Management** has been developed by the University of New England (UNE) and commenced in February 2014. This program provides an integrated Vocational Education and Training (VET) and higher education degree for people who are looking to start or progress their career in agricultural production and management.

This course provides exit points at Diploma, Advanced Diploma, Associate Degree and Degree after three years of full-time study. By completing the Bachelor of Agricultural Production and Management, you will have attained national competencies in agricultural production, farm management, leadership and communication, with university units in agricultural science and systems management.

There are five Majors: (1) Crop Production; (2) Livestock Production; (3) Feedlot Management; (4) Production Horticulture; and (5) Poultry Production. You will learn about the latest technology, including precision agriculture and spatial mapping. As a graduate, you will have the technical and management skills required to integrate agricultural technology with the capability to evaluate and manage the productivity, efficiency, profitability, and ecological sustainability of today's farming enterprises.

Entry requirements

The degree program attracts a new cohort of students who may not normally have considered undertaking a University degree. Entry criteria for each part of the program are:

1) RuralBiz Training entry requirements (for VET units)

- i) Completion of Year 12 or be able to demonstrate similar literacy and numeracy levels, AND
- ii) Access to adequate internet (satellite broadband or similar), AND
- iii) Access to a farm workplace as a context for learning and assessment tasks (on campus students use the UNE farm)

2) UNE entry requirement (for Uni units)

- i) The Higher School Certificate, **OR**
- ii) A VET Certificate IV or higher qualification in any field, OR
- iii) Minimum of 4 completed units from an approved Diploma, OR
- iv) The required minimum skills profile assessed against the Australian Core Skills Framework (an online Skills Analysis);

Potential students

While this degree is attractive to school leavers and agriculture trainees who want to progress in an agricultural career, many students are experienced farmers or other people involved in agriculture. Experienced people may use Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) to have their previous work experience and knowledge recognised, allowing them to enter the degree program at the level that best suits their stage of development. For example, experienced farmers may have many of the VET units recognised through RPL, resulting in considerably less units required for completion of the degree.

Program structure

The Degree program incorporates VET (Vocational Education and Training) units from the national AHC Training Package in conjunction with university units, delivered by UNE. Students are enrolled with both RuralBiz Training and UNE.

Completion of the VET units results in the AHC50116 Diploma of Agriculture and AHC60316 Advanced Diploma of Agribusiness Management, with additional exit points at Associate Degree and Degree, as you move through your units. This provides flexibility, allowing you to choose the exit point which suits you.

Delivery

All units in both RuralBiz Training and UNE programs are available online. There is <u>no</u> residential school requirement with the RuralBiz Training units. Many of the UNE units <u>do</u> have a requirement to physically attend a short (2-3 day) intensive on campus school. The degree may be completed in part-time mode, and it is anticipated that many students will be employed and take the part-time option.

You may enrol in the VET units with RuralBiz Training in any month apart from Dec/Jan. UNE units are spread over the three trimesters of the university academic year. Many students choose to enrol concurrently with both RuralBiz Training and UNE, allowing a lot of flexibility in study patterns. A list of the required units available through RuralBiz Training is given over page. Students who hold a recognised substitute unit will not be required to complete the corresponding core unit.

RuralBiz Training has a UNE branch office and the delivery of the UNE and RuralBiz Training units will be closely co-ordinated for each student.

RuralBiz Training students may apply for RPL based on their previous study or experiences.
